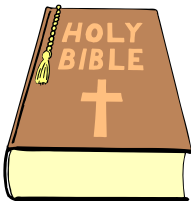

We come to the time of year when we remember the incarnation of the Word who created all things, but forget the link between that and the existence of the Church. The reason Jesus came, lived died and was resurrected was so that there would be a Church one that included not only Jews but Gentiles from all over the world.

This Christmas as we give thanks to God for the Lord our Saviour let us also remember those who share in his suffering. The Church in Syria that is being systematically destroyed by Islamists, the Church in China that is having a problem printing sufficient Bibles for the need there is and for the Church in Europe where there is such a sad decline in understanding the truth for what it is and believing it. Let us pray for ourselves as we grow in grace come to understand, know and live the truth and invite others to know the Lord Jesus as Saviour.

Since his visit we have been collecting wool and knitting needles to send to the school, as we learned that the little girls there are desperate to learn to knit.

In the last two weeks we have heard a message taken from a collection of tea-towels and listened to some amusing, comforting and uplifting poems and readings.

As our meetings continue, we look forward to hearing from a variety of speakers – ministers and lay people – who will tell us their stories or encourage us with words from scripture.

Our meetings are very relaxed and cheerful with time for a chat over a cup of tea. So far this year we have welcomed a couple of new members and would love if any other ladies in the congregation who are free on a Tuesday afternoon would like to come and join us.

'All scripture is God-breathed and is useful for teaching, rebuking, correcting and training in righteousness, so that the man of God may be thoroughly equipped for every good work.'

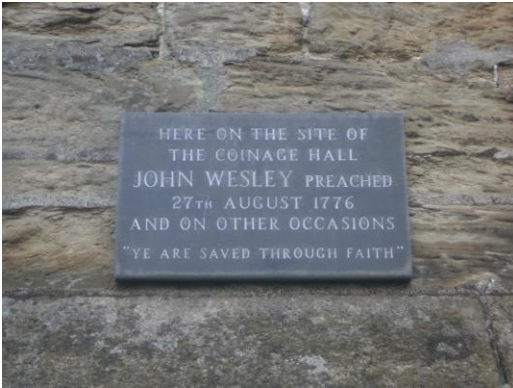
2 Timothy 3:16

O BROTHER!

Brothers! You probably know some: you may even be one! They can be bitter enemies, or they can be the best of friends. The Bible has many examples of brothers, from Cain and Abel to James and John.

At Christmas, one of the carols you will probably either hear or sing will be 'Hark! The herald angels sing'. This hymn was written by Charles Wesley. Charles had a brother, John, who was a preacher and tireless evangelist. In an age before car travel, he journeyed the length and breadth of Britain on horseback, preaching to those who would – and those who wouldn't! – listen. It is estimated he travelled thousands of miles in his ministry, reaching thousands who would never go to church. In some places he was warmly welcomed; in others he was violently attacked and driven out of town by mobs!

You can find evidences of John Wesley's ministry all over the country, plaques on places where he preached.
