She was brought to God and she found him to be good in way that no one else she knew had ever been good to her, and loving in a way that no one

else she knew had ever loved her. She became a Christian and her life has been changed and transformed by Christ. The Christian message is one of hope and salvation, of cleansing and renewing, of reconciliation to God who is so kind and good and showed it in Christ's death and resurrection and bringing us to him to find his grace and mercy.

May God grant to each of us this love and mercy, and the opportunities and willingness to share the good news with others.
