Are you not so grieved to see so many members of the Church of Jesus Christ, those who are truly born again of the Holy Spirit, who do not attend or do so irregularly for no apparently good reason?

What is surprising is that those whose love has not grown cold are so unresponsive and apparently so unconcerned. Has this tragedy prompted any more to cry out to God in concerted prayer as the great need of the hour? In all the busyness of our lives are we not going to spare time to plead with God for our nation, our friends and family who do not know God?

I am sure you would do that in the quietness of your own home. However, when the Church is in full vitality of its life its members devote themselves to `...the apostle's teaching and the fellowship, to the breaking of

the bread and the prayers.' This was done as a fellowship and in order to strengthen the church family which in many ways is your new, real, and eternal family.

As God has given us time and grace, let us heed the warning of Hebrews not to neglect meeting together and grow up in our most holy faith together. The Lord asks of us one day of rest and a morning and evening service of praise and scripture reading, and we have arranged one evening of Bible Study per week so that we can learn about what it is to be a Christian.

Do not be discouraged, and never give up.

Used Postage Stamps




Please remember to save your stamps for the New Marie Curie Centre at Huntershill.

The Reformation – 450 Years On

It is now 450 years since the Reformation and the Church of Scotland officially began. For the past two years we have organised church history trips. Two years ago we looked at the Covenanters in Ayrshire and Lanarkshire. Last year we went to St Andrews and remembered the sacrifice of Patrick Hamilton and George Wishart.

This year the bus trip will, for obvious reasons, focus on Haddington, the birthplace of John Knox and a place steeped in church history. George Wishart preached there and so did John Wesley. John Brown of Haddington became famous for his translation of the Bible (*Brown's Bible*) and his Bible dictionary.

The trip will be sometime in August.

We would like to commemorate the Reformation in October over a weekend with a lecture on the Friday evening, a dinner with guest speakers on the Saturday, and a service to commemorate the Reformation on the Sunday morning. Plannning is still embryonic but the event will take place in October.

This is not something you would want to miss!

And in Germany....Reformation Day is a public



holiday in five states in Germany on October 31 each year to remember the religious Reformation in Europe. It commemorates Dr. Martin Luther's posting of his Ninety-five Theses on the door of the Castle Church in Wittenberg, Germany on October 31, 1517.

While it had profound and lasting impacts on the political,

economic, social, literary, and artistic aspects of modern society, the Reformation was at its heart a religious movement - the great rediscovery of the doctrine of justification, that is, the good news of salvation by grace through faith for Christ's sake:

"For it is by grace you have been saved, through faith – and this not from yourselves, it is the gift of God – not by works, so that no-one can boast" Ephesians 2:8

Rita Archibald says, "In May the members of the Friendship Club had our annual bus run. The trip


included a visit to Callander, a sail on Loch katrine, and a meal at Aberfoyle. Everyone had a great time and were blessed with fine weather! "
